DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Riverside Drive Historic Area is bounded by 4th Street and the alley between Greenup and Garrard Streets and the Ohio and Licking Rivers. From the earliest days of Covington this area was selected by many prominent people for building the finest homes of the city.

The houses that make up the area today date from the early 1800s. The area boasts 31 structures that are considered exceptionally good examples of their various styles of architecture.

The Thomas Carneal House, built in 1815 by one of the founders of Covington, is recognized as one of the finest brick houses of its type in the nation. It is of a transitional Georgian style with a number of Palladian influences. The brick work and iron details is of the best quality. This house still affords a tunnel leading to the Licking River, once used by slaves escaping to the North.

Several very fine large French Victorian houses are in the area as well as a number of houses with Gothic influences.

Riverside House, built by Charles McLaughlin, was inspired by the Southern mansion architecture with white column and double oporch overlooking the Ohio River.

There are also two separate row-houses groups of excellent detail, one in the Greek Revival style and the other in Victorian townhouse style.

A small group of Regency houses cluster on the Ohio River bank, while several large Greek Revival mansions grace the inner area.

The Daniel C. Beard House is the home of the founder of the Boy Scouts of America and is a National Landmark.

This small area has an exceptional architectural record. It has been carefully preserved and restored, largely by individuals who live in the area. The majority of the residents are solidly behind the Northern Kentucky Heritage League preservation efforts and have worked consistently for the area's protection. College professors of architecture bring their students here to learn from what has been called "a museum of architectural gems." And artists are a usual sight as they capture the grace and color of the area for posterity.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

One of the most popular gathering places along the Ohio River in the early days when this country was being settled was the point of land formed by the junction of the Licking River with the Ohio River. This land was later to become Covington, Ky., and the point is the present Riverside Drive Historic Area.

When the blue grass area at Bryan Station and Blue Licks was attacked by marauding Indians from Ohio, George Rogers Clark, a Colonel in the Kentucky-Virginia Militia, chose the Riverside area to assemble his troops. Clark also used the area as a gathering point when he led his mounted men into the Northwest Territory against the British. A plague to his memory dominates the park named in his honor in the center of the Riverside Area.

Richard C. Haupt, Director of Cincinnati Historical Society has expressed his belief that the very first settlers in the Greater Cincinnati area chose the Riverside Area for residence. As time went on, Riverside became the site of Covington's and Greater Cincinnati's most elegant homes. The Carneal House on 2nd Street, built in 1815, still remains the outstanding manor house of the area. The Marquis de LaFayette was entertained there in 1825 on his triumphal tour of the United States.

Daniel Carter Beard (the first national commissioner of the Boy Scouts of America and often called its founder) lived in a brick Victorian house on 3rd Street. Beard's first club was known as the "Sons of Daniel Boone" and it was this group which he turned into the Boys Scouts organization in 1910. His former home is a Registered National Landmark.

Even the names of the streets in the Riverside Area have historical significance. Garrard & Shelby were Kentucky governors and Kennedy was the pioneer who first bought the land and settled on the site which was to become Covington.



After careful professional review, the National Register, in consultation with the Internal Revenue Service, determined that your proposed work on the carriage house would probably constitute reconstruction rather than rehabilitation and therefore would not be eligible for 60-month amortization. This decision was based in part on the publication of interim regulations on August 30, 1978, by the IRS on Amortization of Certain Rehabilitation Costs for Certified Listoric Structures. A copy of these regulations is enclosed. The National Register is aware of your previous contributions to historic preservation and we believe that your proposed work on the carriage house will enhance the quality of the total historical complex. Questions concerning this determination should be addressed to the Keeper of the National Register, Heritage Conservation and Recreation Service, U.S. Department of the Interior, Washington, D.C. 20240. Dear Mr. Johnson:

This is in reference to the proposed 5th Street Bridge over the Licking River from Covington to Newport, Kentucky, an undertaking of the Federal Highway Administration that will have an adverse effect on the Ohio Riverside and the Licking Riverside Historic Districts, and the Johnthan David Hearne House, Covington, Kentucky, properties included in the National Register of Historic Places. After several on-site inspections, a review and assessment of the preliminary case report including your March 9, 1978 evaluation of effects to the historic districts, and in light of the information obtained at the March 16, 1978, public information meeting, Council staff is of the opinion that in accordance with Section 800.4(d) of the Council's Procedures for the Protection of Historic and Cultural Properties" (36 CFR Part 800) the "no build" option appears to be a feasible and prudent alternative to avoid any adverse effects. We therefore cannot recommend to the Executive Director the execution of a Memorandum of Agreement on your current proposal in accordance with 36 CFR Section 800.4(g).

In light of this current impasse, we request that you investigate non-construction alternatives for channeling traffic into Newport. For example, consideration should be given to routing traffic across the I-75 bridge along the Fort Washington Way (Cincinnati, Ohio) and into Newport via theDaniel Beard Bridge. Furthermore, without the origin and destination data requested by Council staff in our initial December 7, 1977, meeting, it is impossible to evaluate the real feasibility of alternates 6 and 7. We request that such data be provided at your earliest convenience.

At this time, we can only go on record as stating that it appears that the need for constructing the proposed bridge at 5th Street is hardly justified in light of the potential, irreparable, long range effects on the historic areas.
