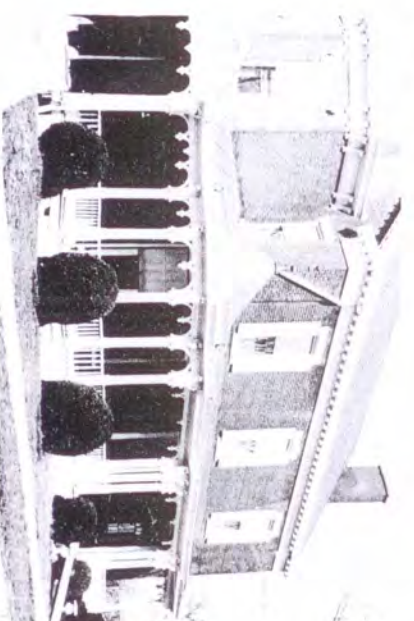
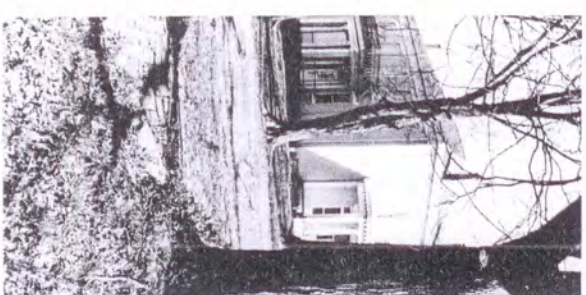
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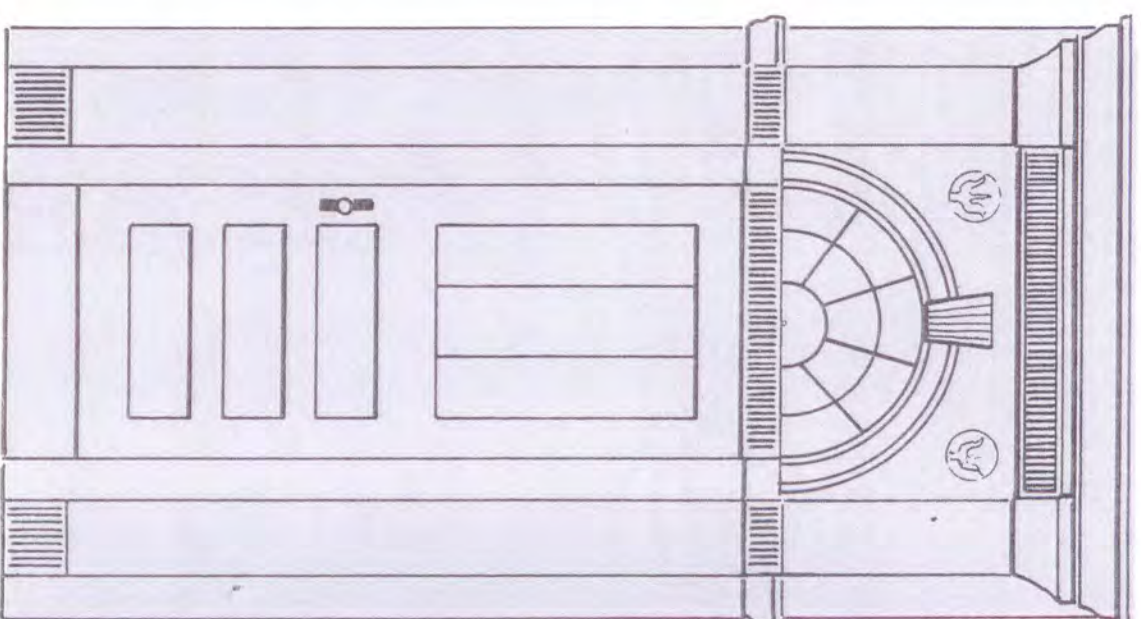
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(10) Thornton F. Marshall Home, the residence of Senator Marshall, who cast the deciding vote that kept Kentucky in the "Union." (11) Old Methodist Church built in 1819. Main building of the preparatory department, Kentucky conference of the Methodist Church. (12) Augusta Public Square was the site of the 1st Bracken County Court House and jail 1803. The old jail is still standing and is used as part of the Augusta City Park. (13) White Hall is the ancestral home of General George C. Marshall. (14) Lewis Wells Home, built just before the Civil War, is a fine example of colonial architecture. (15) Dr. Joseph S. Tomlinson Home, built in 1823, was the home of the 1st President of the Augusta College. Dr. Tomlinson was visited by his nephew Stephen Collins Foster during the summers. These pleasant visits helped to later inspire Foster when he wrote "My Old Kentucky Home." (16) West Boarding House, built in 1822, was originally used as a dormitory for the Augusta College. (17) Site of Augusta College, built in 1822, was the first Methodist College in the world. (18) Echo Hall, built in 1822, was an original dormitory building of the Augusta College. (19) First Baptist Church building which was built in 1818 and later used by students of the Augusta College. (20) Sylvanus McKibben Home, a fine 19th century residence. (21) Dickin-son Morris Home, built in 1775, was the location of the first session of court held in Bracken County in 1796. (22) The lot on which the Leonard Wittmeier home was built is accredited as being the first lot sold after the organization of Augusta. (23) Vachel Weldin Home, was the residence of some of the 1st settlers of Augusta. The early graves of Vachel and Margaret Weldin are in back of the house. (24) R. W. Winter Home, was built in the 1800's after the style of the early townhouses of Charlestown, South Carolina. (25) Moore-Parker Funeral Home was built by B. F. Powers, a tobacco man who helped establish the tobacco market in Cincinnati which later became the second largest in the world. (26) Bracken Academy, established in 1798, later was merged to become the Augusta College. (27) F. L. Cleveland Home—F. L. Cleveland was an attorney and father of Justice Harland Cleveland of Cincinnati. (28) George Doniphan Home was a log house in 1790 when George Doniphan (father of Judge Doni-phan) was born. George Doniphan was a lawyer and a professor in the Augusta College and operated a "tannery" to the west of the house. (29) Metcalfe Funeral Home was the home of Joseph Doniphan who attended the Augusta College. This interesting architectural home was built around 1856 by Judge Doniphan's father who resided across the street.

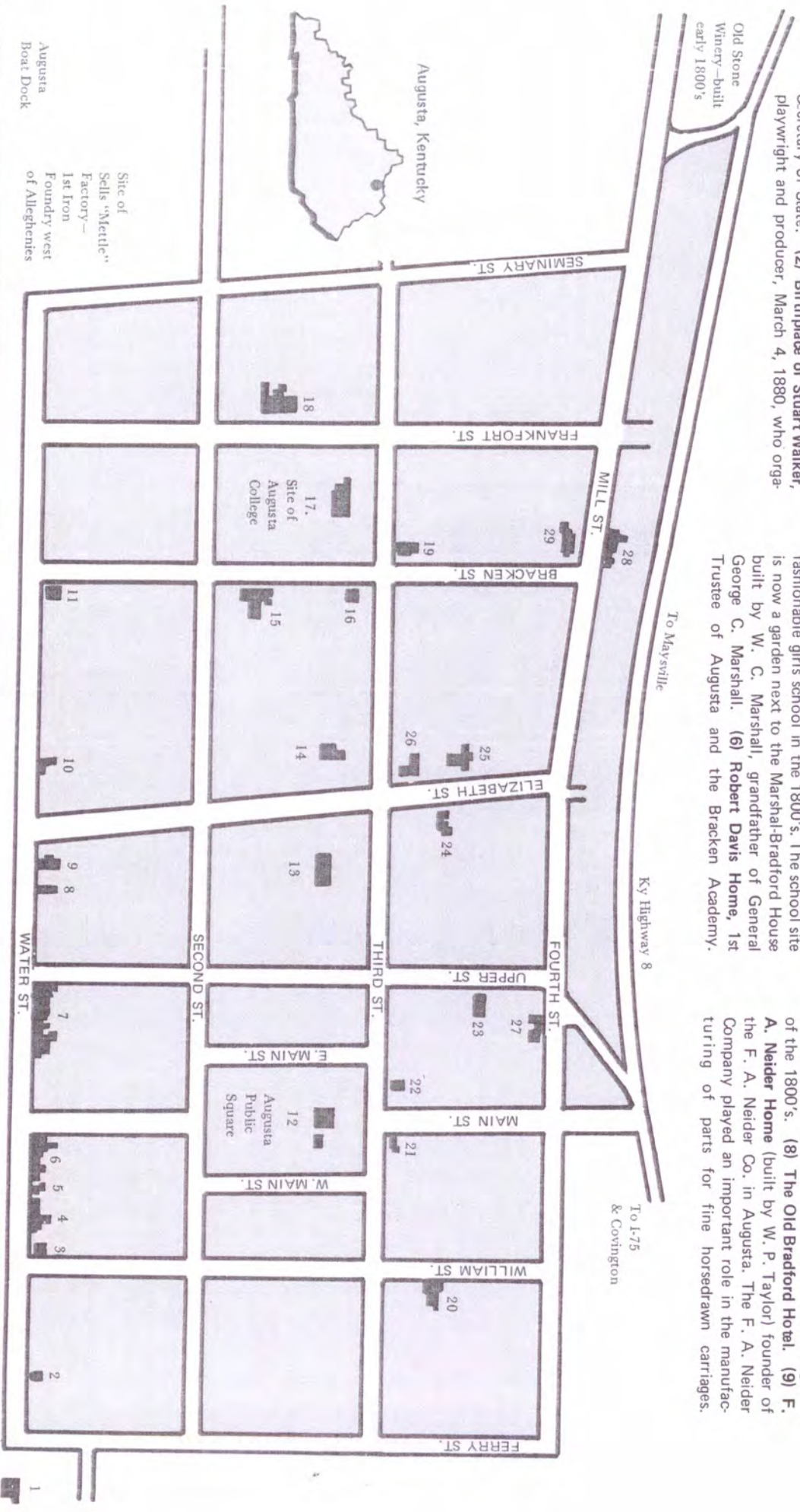
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(1) **General John Payne Home**, built around 1792, was visited by W. H. Harrison on the way to his inauguration. General Payne served in the War of 1812, as did his father, Major Duval Payne. Both are buried in the Payne Cemetery. It was here that Laura Bradford Marshall, mother of George C. Marshall, lived. George C. Marshall, the "great organizer" later became Chief of Staff of the United States Army and Secretary of State. (2) **Birthplace of Stuart Walker**, playwright and producer, March 4, 1880, who orga-

nized Stuart Walker Players of Cincinnati, Ohio. (3) **Schoolfield School** is an old log building standing prior to 1795. It was the first school in Bracken County. (4) **Tom Broshans Tavern** has been traced back to 1795 and is believed to be the oldest 3-story brick residence in Northern Kentucky. The log cabin in back is traditionally said to be the home of Simon Kenton. (5) **Site of Miss Birdie Blades School**, a fashionable girls school in the 1800's. The school site is now a garden next to the Marshal-Bradford House built by W. C. Marshall, grandfather of General George C. Marshall. (6) **Robert Davis Home**, 1st Trustee of Augusta and the Bracken Academy.

(7) **Early Kentucky Row House**. The Piedmont House with its famous Piedmont Door which was brought from the Piedmont area of Virginia is a part of this row structure. The Piedmont House was the home of the Armstrong family and where the first Methodist Society in Augusta was founded. Later, this house was the residence of Dr. Joshua Taylor Bradford, one of the most famous American Surgeons of the 1800's. (8) **The Old Bradford Hotel**. (9) **F. A. Neider Home** (built by W. P. Taylor) founder of the F. A. Neider Co. in Augusta. The F. A. Neider Company played an important role in the manufacturing of parts for fine horsedrawn carriages.
