PAROCHIAL SCHOOLS

ST. AUGUSTINE PAROCHIAL—AUGUSTA, KY.—The original school was a one room structure in which the pupils were taught by the pastor. About 1878 there was a second room added and the Sisters of Notre Dame of Covington took charge of the school. This change occurred during the pastorate of Father Osten Loengenberg. A five room cottage was erected for the sisters which was replaced by the present building in 1905 which houses both the school and the Sisters. The present building was built during the pastorate of Father Anthony Goebel.

At present there are sixty-six pupils in the school.

ST. JAMES PAROCHIAL SCHOOL—BROOKSVILLE, KY.—The first Parochial school was organized by Rev. A. Redmond in 1877, and was taught for five years by Miss Louise Gilmore (Mrs. W. O. Blackerby) of Maysville, now of Brooksville.

The school has grown from a one-room building to a modern brick structure, which was built under the pastorate of Rev. Gerald J. Connelley.

At present there are 75 pupils attending the regular classes, and music and business courses are also being taught by the Sisters of the Benedictine order.

Rev. Lawrence Leinheuser, the present pastor, has been in charge of the school for the past nine years.
