Officially organized and Constituted
January 11, 1878
Lewis & Solin was instrumental in its beginning
by conducting a meeting in Glencoe, using a
(bar-room) as a place of preaching.
Elder Solin was called as its first Pastor.

Origin of Baptist Church of Christ at Glencoe.

Providence, extends its view to all, from rolling w^orld^s, to falling Sparrows.—All events it guides, controls, overrules, edifying still God's glory and the highest good of all that trust him." Hence Shakespeare, "There's a divinity that shapes our ends, Rough haw them as we will." This is true in regard to our little church. Sister Mary B Robinson of the Warsaw church but a resident here at Glencoe wrote last March an invitation to Eld. Lewis H. Salin to visit this place and to preach the gospel to the citizens describing it as a missionary field.

The invitation was accepted and Bro Salin commenced a meeting of days in April last. There was no church in the place and therefore he occupied an abandoned bar room as a place for preaching. Soone this was found too small, and a large blacksmith shop was procured to carry on the meeting. God blessed the effort and twenty three precious souls united with the denomination taking their membership in the neighboring churches. Bro Salin drew up a subscription for the purpose of purchasing the blacksmith shop and of converting it into a house of worship.

Like David who changed the threshing floor of Araunah the Jebusite unto a place of worship where his son Solomon in after years erected the temple of God.

He solicited subscription and in a short time his plan was executed. The shop was purchased and a house of worship erected in its place, and now where once the sound of the iron hammer was heard the sweet voice of praise rise up to God in thanksgiving for his goodness and mercy.

On the 11 day of January 1878 a council was called by a company of brethren and sisters in the ^{the} Scot to become an independent church which met at ^{the} Glencoe at ¹⁰ o'clock A.M. Brother M. J. Williams ^{of Sydney Co.} was chosen moderator and Brother John Miles C.R.C.

The records referring to the call of the council were read from which it appears, that the object is to constitute a church at Glencoe. The credentials of the messengers were presented. The following churches sent the brethren namely.

1st The council after hearing the covenant and the articles of faith read agreed unanimously to go into the constitution of the church old John Holdrop gave a charge to the newly constituted church and the council extended the right hand of fellowship and offered prayer for their success.

2nd Covenant and Declarations of Faith as presented by the above named brethren and sisters which which was read and approved and upon it they were pronounced regularly constituted a church of Jesus Christ to keep up the word and ordinances of the gospel and as such the council extended their hands of fellowship.

On motion the clerk was appointed to prepare a report of the proceedings of the council for publication in the Western Recorder.
