Outline of the Course of Study.

The school will be divided into three departments, Primary, Intermediate, and Academic, and the last subdivided into Classical and English.

The Classical Course is arranged to furnish preparation for the best colleges and universities. The English Course is intended for those who will finish their school education with us, and prepares for business life.

Pupils preparing for scientific schools or for the scientific course in college or university, will be given such studies from both the Classical and English Courses as are required.

A special course of selected studies will be arranged, when deemed best. Subjects not named in the courses will be introduced when it is advantageous to do so.

The time prescribed for each year's work is relative; no pupil is advanced more rapidly than is consistent with a mastery of the subject in hand, nor is he held back when prepared to advance.

Primary Department.

This will occupy three years and include:—Reading through the Third Reader; Oral and Written Spelling; Arithmetic through Short Division; Language Lessons; Geography from the Globe and Compass; Penmanship; Recitation of suitable selections from the poets or prose writers; French or German if desired.

Intermediate Department.

This will occupy three years and include;—Reading through the Fifth reader, with supplementary reading from other books, magazines, etc.; Spelling and the study of words; Written Arithmetic to Simple Interest; Mental Arithmetic; Geography.; English Grammar; History of the United States; Penmanship; Practice in Composition and Declamation; French or German, if desired.

Academic Department.

English Course.

This will occupy four years as follows;

FIRST YEAR—Familiar Science, Mental and Written Arithmetic, English Grammar, Reading in selected books, Spelling and the Study of Words, History of England.

SECOND YEAR—Higher Arithmetic, Physiology, Physical Geography, Algebra, English Composition, General History, Constitution of the United States.

THIRD YEAR—Algebra, General History, Physics, Rhetoric, Zoology.

FOURTH YEAR—Geometry, English Literature, Book-keeping, Chemistry, Botany or Geology, Trigonometry and Surveying.

Classical Course.

This will occupy five years as follows:

FIRST YEAR—Latin Grammar and Exercises, Familiar Science, Mental and Written Arithmetic, English Grammar, Reading in selected books, Spelling and the Study of Words.

SECOND YEAR—Latin (Cæsar), Physiology, English Composition, Algebra, General History.

THIRD YEAR—Latin (Virgil), Greek Grammar and Exercises, Algebra, General History.

FOURTH YEAR—Latin (Cicero), Greek (Xenophon's Anabasis), Geometry French or German if necessary.

FIFTH YEAR—Latin (Cæsar and Virgil), Latin Prose and

Reviews, Greek (Homer's Iliad), Greek Prose and Reviews, French or German, if necessary, Review of College Examination Subjects, Sight Reading of Latin and Greek throughout the course.

Practice in composition, declamation and debates continued throughout the Academic Department. Penmanship may be continued if desired.

Admission of Pupils.

Boys will be received at the earliest school age and continued until they are qualified for college or business.

Careful attention is given to place pupils in grades and studies where they can make satisfactory progress and master the work undertaken.

Cheerful and ready obedience to the few rules of the school, bearing both upon the moral habits and mental application, will be required.

Pupils may be entered at any time for the remainder of the current term.

Attendance and Reports.

The daily sessions will open at nine o'clock and close at half past two, with a recess of half an hour at noon. Pupils coming on the railroad can leave before the close of school, if necessary, in time for the train. Punctual and regular attendance is essential to true progress and will be required. No pupil is excused for absence or tardiness without the *written request* of parent or guardian. A report showing the standing of the pupil in the work of the school will be sent to the parents or guardians monthly.

Examinations.

Examinations are held at different times during the year and result noted on the monthly report.

Location.

The school is located on the southeast corner of Fourth and Russell streets, in one of the best residence portions of the city, and being on a line of street railway is accessible from any part of the city or from Cincinnati or Newport. The building is well lighted and ventilated, while a large yard furnishes ample playground.

Physical Exercise.

In order to promote correct physical development simple calisthenic exercises will be given regularly.

Rugby Literary Society.

The Rugby Literary Society, composed of the older students, with officers elected from their own number and one of the Faculty as Directors, furnishes excellent training in literary work and parliamentary practice.
